Many rural roads are in poor condition due to a number of factors, including narrow width, unsealed surfaces, sight issue and challenging terrain or geometry. Many of these roads sit under the 'Default Rural Speed Limit' of 100km/hour, however, the optimal travel speed is substantially less and is often not aligned with the default speed limit.

Existing processes to amend speed limits, even on Council roads, is complex, requiring Department of Transport and Planning (DTP) and Ministerial approval. Subsequently, the majority of speed limit assessments undertaken on rural roads, with the aim of reducing the speed limit, result in a recommendation to leave the 100km/hour unchanged or only marginally decreased.

Local councils, road users and rural communities would benefit greatly by having a new approach where delegation is granted to local government to undertake very specific changes to default speed limits along rural roads.

Implementing speed reduction initiatives along rural road networks would significantly improve driver safety and enable intervention or enforcement to be applied where motorists are driving at dangerous speeds.

This motion is submitted on behalf of the Hume Region Local Government Network. Regional and rural roads in Victoria urgently need support to ensure community safety. Required interventions include:

- 1. Increased funding via Financial Assistance Grants and Roads to Recovery.
- 2. Simplifying access to disaster recovery funds.
- 3. Providing adequate betterment funding.

4. Increasing funding for road safety improvements.

Victoria's rural and regional roads are deteriorating due to insufficient maintenance funding. Federal and State underfunding has strained councils managing aged infrastructure amid climate changes and transport needs. Neglect has jeopardised road safety, hindering regional growth.

Challenges:

- 1. Funding Gap: Federal and State underfunding, especially in Roads to Recovery, fails to meet rising costs and community needs. This gap exacerbates road deterioration, increases accidents, and stunts economic and social connectivity. The Grattan Report underscores the need for an additional \$1 billion annually.
- Disaster Recovery Process: Complex funding processes delay storm damage repairs. Bureaucratic hurdles leave infrastructure vulnerable for extended periods. Inadequate support for betterment leaves rebuilt roads susceptible to future disasters, straining council budgets.

Proposed Solutions:

- 1. Increased Funding Allocations: Call for boosted Federal and State funding to meet maintenance needs. Increase support through Financial Assistance Grants and Roads to Recovery, indexed for inflation. Recent Roads to Recovery funding increases are welcomed. State funding for Regional Roads Victoria must also rise.
- 2. Streamlined Disaster Recovery: Simplify funding access with streamlined assessments. Immediate funding upon application, based on estimates, with audits post-payment, enhances efficiency and trust.
- 3. Integration of Betterment: Include betterment in disaster funds to enhance road resilience and better cope with more contemporary weather patterns. More appropriate infrastructure replacement, without necessarily increased service standards, prevents future damage through appropriately targeted resilience and therefore lowers long-term costs.
- 4. Enhanced Maintenance Practices: Improve maintenance standards to maximise resource efficiency and infrastructure longevity.
- 5. Road Safety Funding: Increase funding for proactive safety measures to reduce accidents and ensure road user safety.
- 6. State Government Accountability: Implement performance reporting for Regional Roads Victoria to track network renewal progress.

Addressing these challenges requires a comprehensive strategy. By tackling funding gaps, improving disaster response, integrating betterment, enhancing maintenance, and boosting road safety, we ensure resilient infrastructure for future generations.

Effective flood mitigation is crucial for safeguarding communities against increasing flood risks exacerbated by climate change. Both policy reform and financial support for urban stormwater management is urgently needed.

Flooding can have major financial, environment, safety, and liveability impacts on all Victorian communities. In the event of a major storm, about 48 per cent of Glen Eira properties, with the combined catchments of Melbourne Water and Council drainage systems, are susceptible to flooding to a depth greater than 50mm. Each year, flooding causes \$550,000 in damage to property and infrastructure in Glen Eira. This is projected to increase to over \$1 million dollars a year by 2100 due to the increasing frequency and intensity of extreme weather events.

Much of the broader stormwater management infrastructure has not had renewal investment. In an urban municipality like Glen Eira, infrastructure is undersized compared to current condition requirements. Annually, Glen Eira City Council invests over \$3m in stormwater detention drainage infrastructure as one means to address the under capacity of the receiving pipes, which are the responsibility of Melbourne Water. Flood mitigation works to upgrade capacity in just one catchment have been assessed to be in the order of \$100m.

Previous motions endorsed by the Municipal Association of Victoria (MAV) on flooding have primarily focused on enhancing resilience in flood-prone communities. These efforts have involved collaborating with councils to update flood hazard controls, integrate flood mapping into planning schemes, and secure funding to manage areas at risk due to climate change. Many councils have advocated for a state-wide planning approach to flood inundation, akin to existing bushfire management frameworks, and have called for emergency management funding to support flood management initiatives.

In 2023-2024, over a dozen councils submitted motions related to flooding to the MAV. These submissions have often been consolidated into unified motions, emphasising the need for a coordinated and comprehensive approach to flood management across the state. It is critical that flood management takes a similar approach to bushfires. The devastating impact of the 2022 floods, affecting 63 of Victoria's 79 local government areas, underscores the necessity for robust flood management strategies. Councils played a critical role during and after these floods and continue to support their communities through long-term recovery.

There were 880 submissions to the Legislative Council Environment and Planning Committee "Inquiry into the 2022 Flood Event in Victoria". The interim report (April 2024) outlines the pressing demand for community support and the complexity of processes associated with flood financial supports. This motion prioritises the need for urgent flood mitigation infrastructure management and some additional advocacy asks based on critical urban infrastructure needs. Updating the Special Building Overlay (SBO) with climate change modelling is essential for councils to manage flood risks effectively. Updating the Special Building Overlay with climate change modelling, despite its political challenges, is essential.

The Victorian Government must prioritise this critical issue with funding to protect community assets and homes. We also need greater collaboration. The collaboration seen in the City of Darebin's initiative for a Local Council Forum on applying flood legislation, provides a model for councils working together to achieve effective flood control and water management outcomes. Continuing a council-by-council approach is not an option. It leaves our communities at risk. State-wide collaboration is critical and urgent.

Motion 4. Connecting communities with better bus infrastructure

Buses provide essential transport for many people in our community, particularly for the many younger and older residents who don't drive and do not live close to a train station. These community members rely on buses to access health services, employment and education. However, the current availability of services, particularly in outer suburbs and rural areas, makes those trips longer and in most cases isolates and disconnects the community from public transport.

Upgrading bus infrastructure, including bus shelters and features that improve accessibility, and increasing the volume and frequency of bus services would achieve better coordination of bus and rail transportation, while also reducing the overall reliance on motor vehicles.

This action would play a critical role in providing better connections across municipalities and improving outcomes for currently isolated and vulnerable communities, while easing congestion on our roads.

Motion 5. Statutory Planning cost shifting from State to Local Governments

Under the State Government's Housing Statement, developers may lodge their request directly with the Minister for Planning, where the application would have a significant economic development or residential development with an affordable housing component, bypassing Council planning approvals.

Changes to these assessment processes will result in the loss of statutory planning application fees for Councils. For some, this could be in excess of \$1 million in lost revenue.

Despite this, Councils are still being requested to provide the State Government with expert advice to support these assessments, but no formal funding arrangement is in place. This places pressure on council funds and resourcing and threatens capacity.

Section 3AA of the Planning and Environment Act 1987 (Act) defines affordable housing in three income bands - very low, low and moderate. Section 3AB of the Act allows the Governor-in-Council to specify income ranges for these bands, which are updated on an annual basis.

As of May 2024, a developer could market a two-bedroom apartment to a family earning up to \$150,030 and claim to be providing affordable housing. The type of housing and the sale price are not reflective of community expectations as they relate to affordable housing.

It is timely that the State Government review the definition of affordable housing to better reflect the needs of those on low and moderate incomes and to ensure the type of housing being delivered is fit for purpose.

The system is also voluntary with no ability for local government to compel a developer to provide or deliver affordable housing even when they propose a development outside the requirements of the relevant planning scheme (i.e. increased height).

To ease the current housing crisis in Victoria, the State Government should consider introducing legislation to require developers to deliver affordable housing for all large developments (50+ dwellings), as has been the standard practice in other jurisdictions across Australia, such as New South Wales and South Australia, for many years.

Motion 7. Development delays

There is a national crisis of housing supply and affordability. Through the Housing Statement, the Victorian Government has introduced policy settings, funding commitments and ambitious targets to redress this severe housing shortage.

To meet the Government's target to build 800,000 homes over the next decade, approximately 80,000 new homes need to be constructed every year. Both the Federal Government and the Victorian Government have identified the planning system as a central barrier to delivering more housing, citing lengthy approval timelines, aversion to new development and restrictions on infill development in urban areas. While outdated planning regimes and process delays may be contributing to the supply shortages, the challenge with increasing supply does not end with receiving planning approval.

In the City of Melbourne alone there are currently 71 active permits for 90 buildings that have not yet progressed to construction. These permits contain proposals for new office accommodation and 17,000 residential dwellings, making up almost a quarter of the Victorian Government's annual housing target. A Ministerial Advisory Committee would provide an opportunity for government to develop a deeper understanding of the challenges facing the development sector and work collaboratively to design measures that will support the delivery of approved dwellings and improve sector confidence.

Motion 8. Regional and metropolitan planning

This motion seeks to reiterate the position of the MAV in relation to the Victorian Government's Plan for Victoria (the Plan). The Plan will set into action what the state will look like over the coming decades.

To support local government deliberation on the Plan and the potential role of the sector, the MAV, through SGS Economics and Planning, produced the paper, <u>Shaping metropolitan</u> <u>Melbourne: A Discussion paper</u> and specifically explored the proposition of 'What a Plan for Victoria should include and how the planning vision could be delivered, with local government acting as a valued and indispensable partner'.

The Discussion Paper stressed that although a state-wide planning framework is supported, a single Plan for Victoria is not sufficient and cannot adequately recognise or distinguish between

metropolitan, regional and rural communities of interest. Plans for both Melbourne and the regions are needed to address the distinct and growing challenges.

The Victorian Government forecasts that Metropolitan Melbourne's population will increase between 2021 to 2051 by over 3 million people to 8 million. As a result, Metropolitan Melbourne is facing unprecedented housing challenges to accommodate this growth. The recently released Housing Statement provides an ambitious target of producing 80,000 dwellings per year to 2051. The Discussion Paper recognises the scale and complexity of the growth management and planning tasks for Melbourne and Victoria and acknowledges the importance of addressing the environmental, social and economic challenges alongside the provision of housing.

Motion 9. Improved standards and funding for infrastructure at risk from climate change

Climate change is being experienced through more extreme weather, including flood events, heat waves and catastrophic bushfires. Impacts are profound, including loss of life, the destruction of homes and public assets, and physical and mental health conditions.

Victorian councils are at the frontline of many of these impacts. Much of the public infrastructure under council management, was designed and built according to different weather modelling.

There are many examples of infrastructure, such as stormwater drainage, no longer being able to withstand the increased severity and frequency of extreme weather events.

The motion proposed through this report seeks to address this challenge in two ways; by ensuring that future assets are built to a standard that would mitigate against new, more extreme weather events; and by provision of a suitably scaled funding program to enable assets in high risks locations to be retrofitted.

In 2021 Deloitte Access Economics estimated natural disasters cost Australia \$38 billion annually and forecast this amount would increase to \$73 billion per year by 2060, under a low-emissions scenario.

The Victorian Government's Built Environment and Climate Change Adaptation Plan 2022-2026 includes recommendations that align with this motion:

- Updated building standards relevant to flood, heatwaves and storm exposure to account for projected climate change hazards, consistent with the typical asset lifecycle, location and use.
- Urban flood-reduction assets (such as a levees, floodways, drains and retention basins) are funded, designed and managed to respond to predicted extremes in flash flooding and sea level rise.

The motion in effect asks the Victorian Government to progress these key recommendations.

Motion 10. E-waste

The Victorian Government brought in a ban on e-waste going to landfill from July 1, 2019.

E-waste is now the world's fastest growing municipal waste stream with an increase in uptake of electronic devices by consumers, and a reduction in their lifecycle and capacity to be recycled.

Although product stewardship programs exist for some electronic steams, such as the national television and computer recycling scheme, most are voluntary. Even where such product stewardship programs exist, where the cost of recycling the product is born by the manufacturer and factored into the sale price, determining which of these streams are entering a Council's ewaste collection, and then obtaining a reimbursement for collecting them can be time consuming and complex.

The cost to avoid e-waste going to landfill is then born in most cases by local government, and thus needs to be reimbursed via rates collected from residents.

Markets for the materials recycled from the e-waste are also becoming less, and there is a future risk of stockpiling and the waste ending up in landfill anyway.

As councils provide a service to their residents to avoid the e-waste going to landfill and collect a landfill levy from these same residents it makes sense for the State Government to return funds back to councils for collecting and transporting e-waste until such time as mandatory retailer return points are established.

At the same time councils, via MAV and ALGA, should continue to advocate for improved product stewardship programs that do not result in councils, and thus the ratepayers, bearing the cost.

Motion 11. Circular Economy

State Government support for expansion of thermal Waste to Energy facilities, with a 1 million tonne cap on Waste to Energy, appears to be at odds with the achievement of higher order outcomes under the waste hierarchy of waste reduction, reuse and recycling.

Certain waste products, such as those derived from fossil fuels e.g. plastics, are not deemed eligible renewable energy sources under the Victorian Renewable Energy Act 2006, and 'renewable energy source' is not a concept in the Circular Economy (Waste Reduction and Recycling) Act 2021. The rationale for any proposed advantage of Waste to Energy technology that bypasses increased emphasis on resource recovery requires justification from both an economic and environmental viewpoint in the state's transition to a Circular Economy.

The Future Fit Program, which intended to address critical gaps across the whole Meals on Wheels Model, must be subjected to rigorous scrutiny to ensure accountability and effectiveness.

The proposed audit of the Future Fit Program is essential to uphold principles of probity, accountability, and effectiveness in public service delivery. By conducting a comprehensive assessment, the Australian Government can address concerns, rectify shortcomings, and ensure that the Meals on Wheels service is delivered efficiently and equitably to those in need. Such an audit should involve independent auditors and stakeholders to guarantee impartiality and comprehensiveness.

Therefore, we urge the Australian Government to initiate a thorough audit encompassing financial expenditures, program implementation, adherence to regulatory standards, and outcomes achieved.

Green Wedge councils carry out significant day-to-day management of Melbourne's Green Wedge, but also manage significant threats to Victoria's biodiversity as located in the Green Wedge, including managing deer and other pest animals, and significant weed proliferation.

Additionally, through their strategic planning function, Councils are required to respond to enforcement matters on private land that contribute to an increase in threats. Green Wedge Councils responsibilities have broader implications than simply local outcomes, rather they deal with landscape scale impacts and require significant resourcing in order for them to be effectively fulfilled.

These responsibilities and resourcing/cost implications set Green Wedge Councils apart from Metropolitan Council's. As the State Government continues to implement its planning reform to address the housing shortage, and as populations in urban areas become higher in density, protecting our Green Wedge areas for its biodiversity values and as 'the lungs of Melbourne' will become even more critical.

It is essential that the State Government shares responsibility for Green Wedge areas, so that they can continue providing communities with lush green corridors, fresh air and food security, while also ensuring the State's biodiversity is protected for our future generations.

State Government funding support for Maternal and Child Health Service is critical to ensure the sustainability of service as our communities continue to grow and the expectations on the service expand over time.

The current formula does not reflect the real cost of delivering the service and Councils are typically funding more than 60% of the real cost.

Councils' ability to provide more funding for this essential service is also restricted by rate capping. Councils' capacity to fill the finding gap is severely limited, as Councils also compete against other parts of the sector for qualified staff. In some Councils, the ability to attract new staff to fill service gaps and replace those who retire is becoming increasingly challenging.

The Maternal and Child Health Service is also experiencing an increase in demand from Cultural and Linguistically Diverse families and First Nation and Torres Straight Island families, as well as increases in presenting concerns of mental health and family violence.

One of the most effective ways to manage these demands is to ensure that Council Maternal and Child Health Services have appropriate staffing levels commensurate with the expectations on the role and the local rate of birth.

Motion 16. Balancing location of renewable energy facilities with protection of High Value Agriculture Land

Recent changes to the planning approval pathways for major renewable energy projects further limit the reasonable objection and concerns of local communities who will have to coexist with these projects.

Currently the Solar Energy Facilities Design and Development Guideline approach to considering the impacts on High Productive Agricultural Land is limited to land within irrigation districts at a site-specific level and ignores the impacts facilities may have on agrotourism precincts such as wine districts.

Greater consideration is required on all factors that contribute to high projective agricultural land including soil, climate and access to water, not just a site's inclusion within an irrigation district. Better mapping and criteria will enable a better balance to be struck between the economic benefits of agrotourism and agricultural productivity with the planned economic benefits of an energy facility.

The best outcomes for people and places are achieved when all three tiers of government work together, in parallel. Community outcomes are negatively affected when other tiers of government make decisions that impact councils without consultation and without assessing regulatory, financial and community impacts.

Examples include:

- grants not being indexed to meet true costs
- new responsibilities without receiving adequate resources
- increased charges without consultation
- revenue is restricted without consideration of cost increase impacts

Local Governments request that:

- State government consults local government prior to developing and again before implementing new policy or legislative changes that will impact local government and their communities.
- State Government uses a rigorous impact assessment mechanism for all policies and decisions affecting local government and their communities.
- State Government publishes the results of its impact assessments.
Motion 19. Waste Management: Statewide Waste Procurement & Contact Management

Waste Management is a critical operational service provided by annually to the community by local government.

Waste disruptions result in significant unplanned financial expenses, negative environmental consequences, and loss of community confidence in all tiers of government and the waste sector.

When China implemented its Sword Policy in 2018 it resulted in significant structural and financial changes in the Victorian recyclables market. This was a wake-up call on the importance of well-planned and coordinated strategic waste at all levels of government.

On 6 June 2019, the Victorian Auditor-General's Office (VAGO) tabled the report "Recovering and Reprocessing Resources from Waste" to Parliament.

The VAGO report made six recommendations for DELWP (Department of Environment Land Water and Planning), eight for SV (sustainability Victoria), four for EPA, and four for MWRRG (Metropolitan Waste and Resource Recovery Group) to improve waste management for all Victorians.

In response the State Government implemented changes including the restructuring of functions within DECCA Department of Environment Conservation and Climate Change (formerly DEWLP), and Sustainability Victoria. The changes included the Waste and Resource Recovery Groups (WRRG's) being disbanded and Recycling Victoria established as a waste sector regulator.

The implemented change did not include implementing a key recommendation for DEWLP from VAGO which was:

"Support the Metropolitan Waste and Resource Recovery Group in its capacity-building initiatives to train councils' staff and waste management and resource recovery groups' staff so that they can effectively deliver their respective waste management roles and responsibilities, including for collective procurement, land-use planning, multi-unit developments' waste management, and food and garden organics."

With the disbandment of the WRRG's, local government lost access to an important collaborative body that provided local government with access to skills and capabilities that are difficult to source and concurrently inefficient to provide at the individual Council level.

The disbandment of the WRRG's meant the private sector no longer has a single point of contact with local and state government making it much harder for the private sector to be informed and access opportunities to provide waste processing and waste services needed across Victoria.

The State Government outlined its goals in the Recycling Victoria: A new Economy Plan in 2020. This is an ambitious plan which requires coordinate effort to achieve targets.

With the State Government increasing the waste levy from 1 July 2025 there is even greater need for substantial and rapid private sector investment in alternative waste technologies, and new innovative products made from recovered materials.

Motion 20. Review of Victorian Grants Commission Funds Allocation Methodology

Rural areas are disproportionately impacted by the worsening effects of climate change, affecting agricultural production and nature-based tourism, which are highly sensitive to a changing and increasingly volatile climate. Rural shires bear the brunt of more frequent and intense climate-driven disasters, including bushfires, floods, and droughts.

Ageing infrastructure and rural roads are ill-equipped to handle these extreme climatic events, leading to increased deterioration. Climate change vulnerability, combined with the demands of heavy transport and tourism, creates extra burdens on rural Council services and road infrastructure, making funding increasingly difficult.

Many floods, storms, and fires do not meet the threshold for government funding, leaving councils to cover these costs. Rural councils are more susceptible to these frequent emergencies and face additional challenges due to rate capping and limited ability to raise alternative revenue, unlike larger urban councils.

A study by Rural Councils Victoria (2022) concluded that rural councils' new or 'boutique' revenue sources are unlikely to generate sufficient income to improve local government finances. The solution likely requires improved access to national tax revenues.

Rural councils also contend with the high costs of CHMPs for capital works due to the prevalence of undisturbed land.

Consequently, rural councils are least likely to generate surplus funds to address these demands, as evidenced by having the largest relative underlying deficits among Victorian Councils.

We call for a review of the VGC's methodology in determining the allocation of Commonwealth Financial Assistance Grants to recognise the increased financial pressures and lack of alternative income streams for rural councils.

Motion 21. Retaining the Country Character of Rural and Regional Townships

This motion is submitted on behalf of the Hume Region Local Government Network. The character of the natural and built environments across the Hume Region varies significantly among the different municipalities. "Neighbourhood character" refers to the cumulative impact of every property, public place, or piece of infrastructure, whether great or small. This interplay forms the basis of a place's unique character. It is important to ensure new development feels like it belongs and reflects local values and features. Applying metropolitan-based controls risks the loss of unique character in rural municipalities.

Rural areas are one of the region's greatest assets, significant for both agricultural production and natural landscapes that promote tourism and attract visitors. Many rural valleys are recognised for their unique landscape qualities and are worthy of protection. The scenic value of mountains, foothills, valleys, and cleared grazing country is intrinsic to the region's landscape.

Towns such as Mansfield, Benalla, Wangaratta, Beechworth and Marysville are known for their unique character and distinct features. Preserving their charm and appeal, even while supporting population growth, is essential to avoid becoming generic urban sprawl.

Rural Town Character

Towns across the Hume Region, such as Mansfield, Benalla, Wangaratta, and Marysville, are known for their unique and distinct features. Mansfield has wide streets, large lots, and heritage buildings that should be protected. Benalla's charm lies in its lake, botanical gardens, and artistic heritage. Wangaratta is defined by its rivers and vibrant arts culture, necessitating preservation

of natural landscapes and public river views. Marysville, with its lush gardens and proximity to national parks, focuses on maintaining green spaces and eco-tourism.

Lakeside settlements like Goughs Bay, Howqua Inlet, and Macs Cove feature dwellings designed for water views, dense vegetation, and a holiday atmosphere. Rural villages, often near national parks, are characterised by significant vegetation and scenic views through settlements. Alpine approaches, such as Merrijig and Alpine Ridge, offer expansive mountain views that need protection, especially along key highways.

Motion 22. Increasing funding for legal support for women to escape family violence

With the recent focus on violence against women, the availability of free or low-cost legal services is critical to provide advice and support where women are seeking to leave a violent or abusive relationship.

A recent trial program in the outer east - The Mabels Program - matches a community lawyer with a Maternal and Child Health Nurse within the MCH centre to support women who are considering their options. Women who have recently given birth are at higher risk of family violence. The Mabels program has been proven to be an effective and cost-efficient way to support this vulnerable cohort. Expanding The Mabels Program across Melbourne will support women and help halt the escalating numbers of women being killed by their current or former partner.

Another avenue for support is through Community Legal Centres who provide low or no cost legal advice for residents. Funding is provided by the Commonwealth to the State via a funding agreement which is due for renewal in mid-2025.

Community Legal Centres are struggling with increased demand, workforce attraction and rising costs. A report from March 2024 identified sizeable underfunding, workforce shortages and significant unmet demand for legal advice. <u>Please see 'A sector in crisis, survey report snapshot</u>". Inadequate funding and rising costs are pushing community legal centres to breaking point. Centres are struggling to meet overwhelming demand in the community for legal help, and are being forced to turn people away, reduce services and close outreaches. Frontline workers are suffering high rates of vicarious trauma and burnout, and high staff turnover is contributing to a national workforce crisis." (A Sector in Crisis)

Motion 23. Loss of Community Appeal Rights – VCAT

The Minister for Planning has been responsible for deciding planning permit applications for energy generation facilities with an installed capacity of 1 megawatt or greater for some time.

Further changes recently made to all Planning Schemes in Victoria by the State removes the ability for the Minister's decisions on applications for renewable energy facilities with an installed capacity of 1 megawatt or greater to be reviewed by VCAT.

This means that objectors to an application can no longer apply to VCAT to review the Minister's decisions.

Other parts of the planning permit application process remain the same, such as giving notice to allow submissions to be made in response to the application and seeking the view of authorities including Councils. This provides community members and Council with a pathway to provide views to be considered by the Minister prior to a decision being made on a planning permit application.

The ongoing loss and destruction of arable land currently producing food, beverage, and fibre to renewable energy infrastructure (also transmission lines) could have a serious and long-lasting economic impact to all of our rural communities. In addition to the economic impacts, the loss of agricultural land would also have significant negative social and environmental impacts. While clean, renewable energy is vital to the future of our planet, so too is our ability to feed, nurture and positively grow our rural communities. Having proper and thorough appeal rights helps ensure there are balanced and properly considered planning outcomes for these renewables projects.

Motion 24. Investing in local economies and community renewal

Funding to the Suburban Revitalisation Boards was not continued in the 2024/25 State Budget. As a result, the Suburban Revitalisation Boards will cease activities.

Since its establishment in 2016, the Suburban Revitalisation Program has invested over \$67 million to deliver 579 projects. The eight activity centres are Boronia, Broadmeadows, Frankston, Lilydale, Melton, Noble Park, Reservoir, and Tarneit.

The Suburban Revitalisation Program has taken a coordinated place-based approach to enhancing how people live, work and play through the delivery of activities that:

- improve the physical amenity of key suburban centres and their ability to support local economic activity, community well-being and community members experiencing higher levels of socioeconomic disadvantage.
- Improved community infrastructure that is inviting and inclusive
- Support community services that meet community needs
- Increase community participation in the local economy and public life
- Increase economic activity among local businesses.

Without ongoing funding and support the Boards will not be able to continue its activities.

The Growing Suburbs Fund (GSF) has been cut in several consecutive budgets from \$50 million to just \$5 million. A reduction of 90 per cent in the past two years.

The Growing Suburbs Fund contributes toward critical local community infrastructure needs for the fast-growing outer suburbs within 10 interface councils including Wyndham. In recent years the cost of delivering community infrastructure has increased significantly. While options for Councils to raise the required funding has been constrained through capping of rates, waste levies and other sources of funding. Without co-funding from the State Government critical infrastructure projects will need to be delayed or substantially reduced in scale and scope.

The City of Greater Bendigo would like to understand the completion rate and value that MAV offers for Local Government Areas through State Council process. Motion 26. Alignment of Victorian Government grant funding extensions with Federal Government Fair Work Legislation Amendment (Secure Jobs, Better Pay) Act 2022 and the intent of the Victorian Gender Equality Act 2020

Councils also seek a minimum of six months for recurrent grant funding for the associated written notice of intention to cease or not extend funding to deal with transitional arrangements including termination of staff and cessation of agreements with suppliers.

Fair Work Legislation Amendment (Secure Jobs, Better Pay) Act 2022 (Commonwealth) (Amendment Act) took effect on 6 December 2023, introducing new rules when engaging employees on fixed term employment contracts amongst other things means that Councils can no longer continue renewing employment appointments beyond two (2) years including extensions and renewals and cannot renew or extend more than once.

There are exceptions in the Federal legislation one of which relates to Government Funded Contracts (s333F) of the Amendment Act, however, there has been no guidance from State or Federal Government regarding the operationalising of this legislation.

By way of context, typically all these grant related programs have no reasonable prospect of renewal after the period since they are time limited. Hence the risk for Council's should the associated positions be made permanent by Council and State Government not continue the funding, the Council is faced with either a cost-shifting scenario to keep the program operational

or withdraw the service to the client group the vast majority of which are typically more vulnerable within society.

Examples of Victorian Government grant funded programs include School Focused Youth Services, L2P Programs, other youth related services, Occupational Therapists and Free From Violence, to name a few.

Further the State's own Gender Equality Act 2020 requires public sector organisations to consider gender impacts of their policies, programs, and services. These grant funded programs typically sustain part-time roles (i.e. 100% of all 26 grant funded roles at Maroondah Council are part-time in nature) and most employees in these roles are women (85%).

As outlined in the State Governments own Gender Impact Assessment requirements, Women tend to bear a disproportionate amount of unpaid carer responsibilities, which can limit their ability to engage in full-time employment. Part time and fixed term contracts offer less job security and fewer opportunities for career advancement. Hence Victorian Government grant funding must align with the requirements of Secure Jobs, Better Pay Federal legislation. This would contribute to promoting gender equality through greater job security for women and others in those respective roles.

Motion 27. Keeping our children safe

Our children should always be safe. The requirement for adults, where required by the Act, to hold current Working with Children Check (WWCC), is a tangible way to provide this. For Council, the WWCC requirements apply to both direct relationships (example employees, volunteers, students) and third-party associates (e.g. contractors, procured services, leases/hirers, grant recipients).

It is noted that the current list of convictions that could lead to the denial of a WWCC may not include all Domestic and Family Violence related convictions.

Family violence is a serious community concern and proven offences are classified as a criminal record in the Victorian Justice System. In the 2022/23 financial year within Victoria, there were 93,115 family violence incidents reported. During this period, 11% had the offence proven in Court, and 9% of all incidents involved one or more victims under 18 years of age. Child safety is closely linked to family violence and the safety of children needs to be strengthened as much as possible.

Of concern is that WWCC application assessments primarily focus on identifying offences such as child-related sexual offences, violent crimes, or serious drug offences (as well as professional conduct or disciplinary findings). In Victoria, the WWCC does not disclose details of specific convictions, but is an outcome of an assessment of an individual's suitability to engage with children based on available information. It is concerning that all family violence convictions may not be included in the assessed information, potentially resulting in an unnecessary gap in risk mitigation for child safety.

Motion 28. Royal Commission Recommendations into the Violence, Abuse, Neglect and Exploitation of People with a Disability

The Royal Commission into the 'Violence, Abuse, Neglect and Exploitation of People with a Disability' has shown people with disability continue to experience high rates of violence and abuse, multiple forms of neglect, and sexual and financial exploitation. Violence, abuse, neglect and exploitation are occurring across settings and contexts and throughout different stages of people's lives. Based on their disability, people with disability continue to be excluded from participating in many areas of life.

The Royal Commission has made 222 recommendations on how to improve laws, policies, structures and practices to ensure a more inclusive and just society that supports the independence of people with disability and their right to live free from violence, abuse, neglect and exploitation.

These recommendations are an important step toward promoting inclusivity and protection for the most vulnerable members of our community. It is therefore important for Melton City Council to support these recommendations to Government with a view to achieving change for members of our community living with a disability.

In September 2023, the Victorian Government released its Housing Statement: The Decade Ahead 2024-34. As part of the statement, it announced plans to demolish all 44 public housing towers located in the inner Melbourne metropolitan area.

At the time of the announcement, no consultation had occurred with local government or residents. It is unclear whether a program of renovation has been adequately considered. The Victorian Government has not released the data and evidence it relied upon to make its decision. There has also been considerable criticism of the plan for not considering adaptive re-use options.

There continue to be few program details in the public domain, such as the potential impact to public housing stock, open space and detailed plans for resident relocations.

Melbourne's public housing towers are home to 10,000 people. With an estimated 64,700 public housing dwellings across Victoria, these towers represent a significant proportion of the state's stock.

Demolition will displace residents from their communities, services and supports.

Motion 30. Environmental Education on Crown Land Motion
